Problem(s)	Kirkdale is the most deprived ward within the Liverpool Walton constituency. According to research by the charity National Energy Action (NEA) the national average for England and Wales households in fuel poverty is 13.06%, for the Northwest of England it is 14.4% and Liverpool 16.3%. There are and the latest statistics provided by The Dept for Energy, Security and Net Zero identify that in this constituency there are 8,838 households in fuel poverty – as of April 2023 and for every 1000 homes an average of 141.5 received support from the main national energy efficiency programme. <sup>2</sup>
	The people of Kirkdale often grow up in abject poverty, many experience domestic violence, poor parental mental health and/or substance misuse/dependency, they live in unsafe, overcrowded and cold houses and are exposed to criminality, the most prevalent being knife crime and drug-related gang culture.
	Recently the population of the area has also seen a shift in its ethnic and cultural make up. Once a white-British area, Kirkdale now has a thriving multicultural community. While this has brought the advantages of diversity and inclusion, it has also added further social barriers to the community. That of isolation due to language barriers and further marginalisation of communities.
	The headteacher at Kirkdale St Lawrence primary school and her staff have identified that the school has become a trusted place for parents to access help, but they do not have the resources to meet their non-academic needs. Many of the family are living in privately rented properties, some of which are not well maintained. This in turn impacts the children living in these homes. For parents where English is a second language do not always understand official communications or understand the importance of ventilation when cooking with gas. There is a need for a community hub which can provide advice on income maximisation, fuel poverty and energy efficiency, an awareness of CO and who to contact in the event of an emergency.
Scope and Objectives	Cadent's VCMA funding will be used to create a community hub within school grounds of Kirkdale St Lawrence primary school but with its own entrance and facilities. It will be open all year including holiday periods and provide a safe space for confidential discussions with appropriately trained professionals. It will also provide a community outreach service and create employment for up to 13 members of the community on a part- time/fixed hourly basis and several volunteering opportunities for parents and Masters students from Liverpool universities. The Head Teacher has identified that many of the parents like to cook

	however, a lack of suitable cooking facilities especially for those in temporary accommodation, combined with the rising costs of energy has prevented parents from providing hot nutritious food for their families. The Thermal Cooking Bag, designed and supplied by a local social enterprise The sewing rooms. <sup>2</sup> is being trialled as a potential solution. It only requires the food to be cooked for 10 minutes, and it is more cost effective than a slow cooker. The Sewing rooms will be running an initial session during a half term camp for children in February 2025 using the school kitchen with a view to it being rolled out more widely over the following months.

Evidence of Stakeholder/Customer Support	Cadent has previously conducted and continues to obtain extensive stakeholder and customer engagement on its RIIO- GD2 business plans and subsequent VCMA delivery. For instance, we regularly seek to obtain the feedback of stakeholders such as Citizens Advice and National Energy Action (NEA) to understand the needs of customers in vulnerable situations.
	These regular conversations allow Cadent to gain feedback on the initiatives we are, or should be supporting, and ensure that our VCMA-funded projects are in the best interests of our customers.
	Stakeholders have provided consistent feedback on the need for energy networks to focus their funding on supporting households most impacted by the cost-of-living crisis.
	This project takes this feedback into account by creating a partnership with a trusted local charity, positioned in an area with levels of deprivation and fuel poverty significantly higher than the national average. Additionally, the customer demographic of >65 years old can be disproportionately impacted by fuel poverty, due to factors such as being more at risk of cold related illness, generally having lower levels of

	household income, and spending a greater proportion of time at home.

	60% of participants responded that their households' health or financial situation was worse off this year compared to 2021 levels.
	This project aims to act upon this customer insight and feedback by supporting customers impacted by a downturn in their financial health. This will be achieved through offering services such as income maximisation and benefit entitlement check, energy efficiency advice and CO and PSR awareness to give a wraparound support service.
Information Required	Description
Outcomes, Associated Actions and Success Criteria	The Social Brokers are a Community Interest Company (CIC) established in 2024 in response to a demand for a public health approach to inequalities including housing, mental health and welfare within North Liverpool communities. The Directors had previous experience with organisations who focused on sports or/and employability but research from the University of Liverpool including the Child of the North Suggested early intervention could have lifelong impact on the average life expectation of an individual. The Social Brokers will act as an intermediary between the community and other organisations including DWP, Manchester Fire and Rescue Service and the Liverpool Universities.
	The objective of the project is to create a sustainable community project which will be supported by community-based employees and volunteers including parents and Masters and Doctoral students from the local universities. Volunteers and staff will be trained to deliver energy efficiency advice and CO awareness via a train the trainer model. In addition to the hub based at the school volunteers and staff will be providing an outreach service
	into the community and to other schools within the local area.

Potential for New Learning	This project is unique in that it is creating a purpose-built building using an existing physical safe space to provide a community hub.	
	By adopting a Public Health approach <sup>3</sup> to community issues it recognises the impact of poverty and domestic abuse on women and children and the need to provide safe environments, parent and care giver support and economic strengthening. It is building on the existing sense of community to empower parents	

become advocates in the wider community.The Child of the North <sup>4</sup> report highlighted the differences in life chances for those children born to families where there was economic deprivation. By intervening at primary school level, the expectation is that children will be more prepared when moving on to secondary school increasing their future employment prospects and improving their overall wellbeing.It has also been identified that many parents feel disempowered and do not trust statutory agencies but have engaged with the Social Brokers. The expectation is that child become more engaged in peer-to-peer learning through coffee morning and other sessions delivering CO and Energy Efficiency advice and will want to deliver sessions to other parents and community members in similar situations. The Social Switch Programme has been successful in Camden and Islington with those from a similar background. <sup>5</sup> This type of approach has also been hugely beneficial and successful as part of our C4W programme.Working with the university of Liverpool this project will be evaluated from the outset to understand which factor have both improved the lives of parents but also had a positive impact on their children. It will also have the support of child psychologists and other professionals who will look to create bespoke interventions for those who struggle with mainstream education. In addition, parents who are refugees or asylum seekers with Masters or Doctorate level qualifications will be given access to courses to improve their spoken and written English and improve their employment prospects within academia.Scale of VCMA Project and SROI Calculations, includingTotal Investment = £ 498,057.68
